I have read the investigation as well and I come to a different conclusion. Very upset with what is going on right now -- one allegation after another. We need to get on with the job of the town.

David McChesney - Can’t believe that I read the same report that some of my colleagues have read. The Board of Selectmen is not to be involved in personnel issues – it is up to the Town Manager to handle all personnel issues. I feel the accusations of the Police Chief at the Squealing Pig have been corrected by Mr. McGovern’s public statement.

The incident at the Squealing Pig is being investigated and the town is cooperating. Graduation on Friday was truly a special event that went exceptionally well. The graduates worked very hard to achieve their diplomas, needing to obtain online classes to obtain their requirements. Each graduate received \$1,000 from the Provincetown Police Association.

To the editor:

Your June 6, 2013 front-page article, "Witness says chief 'flew into rage' at local restaurant" is misleading, inaccurate, inflammatory, biased and a disservice to the community. How do I know it is inaccurate? I was there and witnessed the entire incident.

When I read your article I couldn't help but wonder why I wasn't interviewed. I can only think of two reasons. One is that you already had the story you wanted, the one where the police chief was drunk and abusive, and didn't care to hear the truth. The other is that you didn't know I existed because your supposed "witness" never mentioned me. Why? Because he was never there.

If you had bothered to interview me, here's what I would have told you: Although Chief Jaran and his partner Kim Hurd believe they met me once at a gallery opening, to my knowledge that evening was the first time I had ever spoken to either of them. I approached Kim because I recognized her as a Facebook "friend" of mine. As reported, the restaurant was busy with an election party. When that crowd dispersed and because I was having such a pleasant time talking to them, I asked Chief Jaran, Jeff as I had begun to call him, and Kim to stay for another drink, on me. They agreed and we sat at the bar, alone except for two men who hung by the door while going outside to smoke. I was facing the bar, Kim the door and Jeff towards the rear of the restaurant. While I was telling a story I noticed that Kim and Jeff were no longer paying attention and instead were focused on the bartenders. It was in that silence that I heard the "n word" recited in the music playing. I also noticed the bartenders smiling and nodding in agreement with the two men at the door.

The first words I heard spoken were from Kim who said to the bartenders, "Do you think we're stupid? Do you think we don't see what's going on?" Then Jeff added, "You should be ashamed of yourselves. Listen to this. This is disgusting. Think of what just happened in Boston [referring to the recent marathon bombing related shooting death of an officer in Boston] and listen to this song. It makes me sick." At no time whatsoever did Chief Jaran say any of the quotes you attribute to him or anything that could be interpreted as a threat or intimidation. At no point did he even stand up, he remained seated on his stool.

Once the chief vented his frustration, which only last for a minute or two, the three of us left the restaurant. Outside the door were the two men who had earlier laughed along with bartenders. To them, Jeff repeated what he had said to the bartenders inside, that they should be ashamed of themselves and that the song was disgusting. I witnessed this while standing with Kim next to their bikes which were locked on the rack in front of the tourism office. Had there been a man sitting on the bench several feet away from us I certainly would have noticed him. Had he been present to overhear what had gone on in the bar two minutes prior, and had been so taken aback by what he heard, then I find it hard to believe he would have up and left before witnessing the chief exit. Also, I find it dubious that that he would have been able to observe the bartenders fumbling over the iPods from his vantage point. Additionally, how could someone on a bench across the street be able to make the judgment that the song played "randomly?" It seems to me that

these details would have had to be fed to him after the fact.

After spending no more than a minute admonishing the two men, the chief joined Kim and me by their bicycles and cooled down. The three of us talked about what a horrible end this had been to an otherwise pleasant evening. Jeff said he was going to follow up with the owner, Diarmuid (your reporter couldn't even bother to get the spelling of his name correct) the next day. We hugged each other, they drove off on their bikes and I went to the A House. Where was this in your witness's account?

Allow me to state unequivocally, that neither I, nor the chief nor Ms. Hurd were drunk, by any sense of the word. I don't enjoy talking to drunks and never would have bought a drink for anyone I thought wouldn't be a good conversational partner. Was he upset? Most certainly so, as anyone would be in that situation. Was it a "rage?" No, because rage is defined as "to behave violently as in a state a great anger." At no point was Jeff violent or threaten violence. "Livid," would be a more accurate description.

I exchanged a few messages with Kim via Facebook the next day. She informed me that there had been a meeting that day between Jeff, Diarmuid and the bartenders and that the bartenders apologized and the matter was over. As for me, the next time I was at the Squealing Pig and saw one of the bartenders involved, he apologized to me as well. We shook hands and I said there was no need to speak of it again. It was over.

Your article states that your witness came forward because "no one else would." Why didn't I come forward? There was no need. This event was of no interest to anyone other than the parties involved. It has no news value whatsoever, it is mere gossip. Because I saw it only as gossip I made a point of not repeating the story to anyone. In less than a day, the parties involved had settled the matter in a mature manner. For me to spread it around town would only be hurtful to everyone.

Your shameful article has left me no choice but to do whatever I can to set the record straight. For you to publish a month-old story without any corroborating witnesses shows a lack of journalistic ethics. That you would quote someone as saying of the chief of police, "...people are afraid to come forward because he's vindictive" without asking to individual to back up his statement or present another point of view, shows bias. That you could twist this unfortunate incident so as to make Chief Jaran the villain of the story instead of the victim he was, is reprehensible.

Your irresponsibility has rubbed salt in the wound which is the unnecessary tension between the police force and this community. You've done irrevocable damage. You need to apologize, not only to Chief Jaran and his family, but to the entire community as well.

This never should have been brought to the board of selectmen in this manner in the first place. There are protocols in place that are to be followed. May this be a learning experience, Eric, so nothing like this happens again.

Here ya go.

During the most recent selectmen elections, I was approached by Selectman Donegan, then a candidate, regarding alleged police misconduct. The allegation brought before me was that a member of our police dept. threatened a private citizen for expressing his support for Tom Donegan's campaign for Selectman. My initial reaction was that this must be a misunderstanding and it could not be true. The private citizen that made the allegation requested a meeting with myself and Tom Donegan. At the meeting, he presented us a copy of a text conversation between himself and a sergeant in our police dept. I was not fully prepared for the content of this exchange. To this day, I still can't believe it. The Sargent said, "He, (referring to chairman knight), is on our team I can't wait to tell the dept. you support him (referring to Tom Donegan)." The conversation then started paraphrasing other members of the police dept., "The Chief says you're dead to him." it then continues, "Wow you are dead to the Chief even now, you better follow the law to the T as long as you're in this town." Listen to that statement again, "you better follow the law to the T as long as you're in this town." After pressure from myself and the aggrieved parties, the Town manager reluctantly agreed to launch an internal affairs investigation. I have read the report several times and I have reached a number of conclusions:

- 1) I believe the private citizen and Selectman Donegan are the victims of a violation of their civil rights. In a place that cherishes free and fair elections, no voter should be subjected to intimidation and coercion for their political beliefs. Ever.
- 2) I believe the content of the conversation between the Sergeant and the private citizen is so alarming that it borders on criminal harassment.
- 3) My fear is that this threatening behavior is symptomatic of a larger malaise.

With that being said, I don't think any of us, the board of selectmen, our police department, or the town manager should investigate this threatening behavior. It's too much for our community.

I am asking that my colleagues on the Board of Selectmen and the Town Manager join me in referring this matter to the State Police in their ongoing investigation, The attorney generals office and the ethics commission.
